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New Jersey School Breakfast Participation, District-Level Data, By County, October 2018

The federal School Breakfast Program recognizes the strong link between nutrition and learning and provides funds to schools to feed students that all-important morning meal.



Yet many New Jersey schools do not take full advantage of this important nutrition service. Statewide, just 42 percent of low-income children received breakfast in October 2018, down from 44 percent the year before. As a result, New Jersey schools are missing out on nearly \$74 million in federal funds to feed hungry students, according to an analysis conducted by Hunger Free New Jersey and the Food Research & Action Center.

The issue is not enrollment. These students are enrolled in the program. Instead, the issue is when breakfast is served. Serving breakfast before school makes it difficult for students to access breakfast. Bus and family schedules and the stigma of coming to school early to eat keep many children away from the before-school breakfast table. When breakfast is served during the first few minutes of the school and offered to all students, student participation skyrockets. Known as breakfast after the bell, this approach has been proven do-able and effective in districts across New Jersey and the nation.

With assistance from the Food Research & Action Center, Hunger Free New Jersey publishes the following charts, which provide student participation rates for school districts, along with the amount of additional federal dollars districts would receive if they achieved 80 percent student participation. These charts are based on data provided by the New Jersey Department of Agriculture for October 2018 participation.

Hunger Free New Jersey and the New Jersey Food for Thought Campaign encourage local communities to use these data to help implement effective school breakfast programs.

To calculate additional federal reimbursements, FRAC calculated the number of additional children who would be reached if each school district reached 80 percent of students eligible for free or reduced-price school meals, assuming each district's mix of free and reduced-price students would apply to any new participants.
